Wednesday 22nd May: Balcarres, Colinsburgh, Fife. <u>Departing at 1 pm.</u> This is a trip to possibly one of the best gardens in Scotland, last visited in June 2010. Home to the Lindsay family/earls of Crawford almost continuously since the sixteenth century, our hostess this time will be Lady Balniel (daughter-in-law of Lady Crawford who took us on a

tour of the garden last time.) We are again being offered refreshments during our visit and anticipate returning to Broughty Ferry about 6.00 - 6.30 pm.

Thursday 13th June: Logie House, Crossford, Fife. <u>Departing at 1 pm.</u> This trip has a comfort stop at Kinross before travelling to the home of John & Sarah Hunt who have recently joined the Fife Garden Trail as part of the Scottish Gardens' Scheme.
