However, never daunted, there has been plenty garden activity by the Friends in all weathers with winter projects and other activities. Hopefully this newsletter will bring you up to date on recent events, along with a peep into the long awaited spring/summer, signs of which are shooting up fast.

Children in the **Garden**



The garden receives many awards which help towards making it an important and desirable asset for the Council, especially in this time of austerity. As well as our horticultural activities, community involvement is a major feature of these awards. The Friends and the Council fund and run many activities to encourage children to visit and be involved in the garden. The article below is to give you some insight and maybe encourage you to send along your young relatives as well. **Editor**

Countryside Rangers: These attract large numbers of children, sometimes up to 120. The Rangers bring along lots of educational activities to teach children about nature and their surroundings, but most of all to have fun. Each event has a theme, eg Signs of Spring, allowing the children to identify spring flowers and insects; Pond Dipping, discovering what lives in the ponds. Children are also encouraged to bring along their own teddy bears for a Teddy Bears Picnic. Other times children investigate the garden for insects and beasties and this is aptly called The Ugly Bug Ball. Ah, but when October comes along the Rangers set up a Haggis Hunt or similar event around the Garden.

The Storytellers: The Broughty Ferry Librarians come along three times a year to read stories and sing songs to the under 7's to encourage them to start reading. This proves to be a popular event with approximately 20 children and adults attending. Over the years we have adapted this event to include a gazebo for shelter on a sunny day and nursery



chairs for the children to use in the Geddes Glasshouse on a rainy day.

We try to cater for all age groups in our events programme.

School and other groups: The format for the younger groups varies with age. With nursery groups we use visual aids e.g. cardboard signs of various birds, with a short description of the birds, habitat, eating likes etc. We then see if they understand what we have being trying to convey with a chart, and their teachers or carers fill in the appropriate answers. Occasionally, if the weather is poor, we work in the Geddes greenhouse area and encourage them to make items using plasticine.

Sometimes Michael will set up pots and compost in which they can plant seeds, label the pot and take it back to the nursery to watch growing.

Recently the Frances Wright Pre-School Centre came and they found this more challenging. We also have school holiday groups like Barnhill who delight in planting bulbs and visiting areas of particular interest eg the ponds, when tadpoles are visible, looking at trees and discussing leaf formation ie whether prickly, evergreen, etc These children also like to plant seeds and take home pots of wildflowers to grow. During the clean up days we have the local cubs who delight in planting bulbs, from daffodils to snowdrops. With facebook, we now receive requests from more groups and the volunteers take great delight showing the children round the garden, explaining the plants and creatures found around it. Ann Taylor

From the Gardener

Hello again Friends, this winter, the team and I embarked on several projects to improve the garden. We have carried out major pruning, removed old shrubs and uncovered an area which will be replanted. It is hoped that most of the shrubs will rejuvenate and produce new growth. We have also uncovered many more rocks in the borders which will strengthen the Rock Garden theme. Tonnes of mulch have been spread on Sections 2 and 3 to improve nutrients in the soil. Ivy and Vinca has become a problem so we have had to remove these to ensure they do not take over the borders.

We are currently getting ready to service and clean the Geddes Glasshouse and contents. This is to ensure that your garden is ready for the season ahead. Once again, it is hoped to stage the usual program of events including the Gala in the Garden for you to come along and enjoy. Shrubs to look out for in the Rock Garden that are looking stunning at the moment are Garrya Elliptica and Viburnum x bodnantense "Dawn". These mature specimens, situated near the sunken garden beside the railway line, are well worth a look.

The Monday morning group, normally numbering 8 or 9 hardy souls, have been meeting every week from 10 am to 12.00 (but they did have a Christmas/ New Year holiday).

It was agreed in the autumn that the 'winter work' focus would be on the Geddes Glasshouse area. The first task was to remove completely all the alpines from the Raised Bed, putting them in boxes and trays for temporary storage. The old compost was removed, with help from Michael and his electric buggy, and replaced with a fresh alpine mix. The alpines were then replanted in the bed with several groups of new bulbs and hopefully this will be a nice feature for some years. The group will also be improving the borders round the Glasshouse and adding more plants to several other areas of the garden which we maintain. In the Nursery Area, we are growing a wide variety of plants which will be used to enhance the different areas of the garden. **John Grocott**



SUMMER OUTINGS 2017



Wednesday 17th May 2017: Willowhill Garden, Fife

Wednesday 14th June 2017 : The Explorers' Garden, Pitlochry

Our second trip is to the Explorers' Garden at Pitlochry. This garden is a six acre woodland garden dedicated to the Scottish Plant explorers who travelled the globe in search of new plants and trees for cultivation. The garden is separated into glades, representing the area of the world from which the plants come.

We leave Broughty Ferry at 11.00am and arrive at Pitlochry Theatre where a table is booked for us for lunch. We shall pay our own lunch. People can choose whether they want soup and a sandwich, or a cold or hot buffet. The garden tour begins at 1.30pm. The bus will leave again at 4.30pm and we hope to be back to the Ferry about 6.00pm.

Wednesday 19th July 2017: Cambo Gardens, Fife

Our last trip is to Cambo. Many of you will be familiar with Cambo in snow drop time but the garden is worth a visit in all seasons with its walled garden, the burn and three bridges. Tea and coffee are available in the garden.
