As volunteers for the Bumblebee Conservation Trust, this will be the third year we have taken part in their BeeWalk monitoring scheme.

At least once a month, we equip ourselves with recording sheet, magnifying glass, comfy clothes and of course a picnic lunch, then set off on our 'walk'. Starting at Bridge Street, this 'walk' takes us along the top and through the Rock Garden, on to the Nature Reserve, then back along the front of the Garden, ending back where we started. It is important for a scientific study, to always walk exactly the same route! We also try to go on a sunny and relatively calm day....ideal conditions for our bumblebee friends!

Our walk takes us past some wonderful bee friendly planting depending, of course, on the season. From the bell heathers and flowering currant in the spring, to the wonderful array of summer flowering plants, including masterwort, catmint, cotoneaster and scabious, then on to the autumn flowering geraniums, marjoram and sedums, to name but a few. On a warm, sunny day you really are guaranteed to see the most amazing selection of bumbles!

Our task is to record the species of bumble we see, along with the 'caste' (queen, worker or male). In the spring only the queens are out foraging. As the season progresses however, there are many workers followed by males, then finally new queens. All have to be recorded, with us counting sometimes as many as 120! Not always an easy task.

We have seen six regular bumblebee visitors to the Rock Garden. The Buff Tailed, the White Tailed, the



Red Tailed, the Common Carder (all ginger), the Garden Bumble (very like the white tailed but with an extra stripe) and the Early Bumble which is, of course, always earlier than the others! And once, to our very great excitement, we spotted two Tree Bumbles....quite distinctive with their ginger and black bodies and white tails. As its name suggests, it likes trees and bushes. We actually spotted ours in the snowberry in the Nature Reserve.

To us, watching the antics of these lovable, busy little creatures is a most worthwhile and pleasurable activity. As well as watching them, we are concerned about the declining numbers and want to help the scientists look for early warning signs of the particular species most at risk. ## From the Gardener

Hello again Friends,

This winter has allowed us to carry out many seasonal jobs to ensure the garden is ready for the year ahead. Once again we have planted up bulbs to give spring colour. We have mulched a third of the rock garden with leaf mould, our own homemade compost and manure to give nutrients to the soil for the new growing season. We have pruned the rock garden throughout, reducing shrub heights to encourage new growth as well as removing old and diseased shrubs. This is to uncover more rocks to strengthen the rock garden theme and increase planting areas.

Bark chippings have been laid on all paths to improve access for the public and alterations have been done to the snowdrop wood path. At the moment we are working on the border behind the toilets which is turning out to be a big job. We are clearing out Phormium leaves, ivies and suckers. We shall shortly be servicing and cleaning the Geddes Glasshouse, all signs and bins ready for the season to begin. The next job for us is to landscape an area where a large eucalyptus was removed and to improve access to the Geddes Glasshouse. I look forward to staging many events in the Garden this coming year and hope for another successful one. Once again thank you for your continued support. **Michael Laird**



## From the Gardening Team

Up to a dozen of us meet on Monday morning at 10.00, come rain or shine, for our regular gardening session. Despite stopping for coffee and a chat around 11.00 and finishing shortly after 12.00, it is a productive start to the week.

This winter we are supplementing the planting to the rear of the scree area and in the fernery. The planting behind the scree area a few years ago had very limited success due to the poor, dry soil and large tree. As a result the team placed new stones to improve water retention and now have enriched the soil ready for the further planting. An area between the renovated bed and the scree bed, near a bench, is also being re-turfed as it has worn away.

New plants are being raised from seeds and cuttings in the nursery as usual and will be planted in the garden or put on the plant sales table to augment funds. The plant table should be up and running from early May onwards so do have a look throughout the summer months.

## Michael's gardening tip

**Soak your roots.**

The last thing you want is dry roots. Always soak the roots of new plants before you put them in the soil. Make sure the planting hole is bigger than the rootball before you attempt to put it in. The roots of a plant need to be able to spread to get the best chance of finding moisture and absorbing nutrients.
