A journey nearing fruition?





Around 2008 a model of a purpose built 'Buckie' to replace the green metal huts was approved by the committee, but the recession hit the project and it was abandoned. 11th October, 2017, we began the process of looking at the project once again - motivated, perhaps, by the holes in the floor! This time we arranged a visit to the main offices of the Council and put forward our proposal for replacing the huts with 'like for like', such as a used Portakabin ie nothing too ambitious. The Council agreed to make a site visit and three gentlemen from different departments examined the old huts and every aspect of the project. Nothing of course was simple eq new connections

from the sink to the sewer might be required, new foundations etc. This was at the beginning of 2018. Then everything went SILENT!

The year dragged on and, at the end of 2018, the committee and Michael agreed that I should contact the Council to ensure the project was still on their agenda. This paid dividends and resulted in a visit by some gentlemen eager to know more of what we were after. From then on Michael has shown many functionaries around the area and, when on site, I have concurred with him re various aspects.


July 2019 saw us with more pressing matters - 'Gala in the Garden'. Around this time, a range of contractors appeared, having been asked to put in tenders for the various jobs. Hopes rang high - this might just happen! We were informed by the architect it would

be new metal huts designed for the Gardener and the Friends, not reconditioned ones. The plan showed huts sectioned into three areas - one part a garage to house Michael's buggy, the second for Michael's office, and the third for the use of the Friends. I was informed that the tenders would go before the Finance Committee at the end of September so we held our breath to see IF funding would be granted.

September 15th came and went and then came the phone call to say funding had been allocated... WHAT JUBILATION! The Council put forward a starting date of beginning of 2020, but unfortunately, this has had to be postponed until early March. This was because various licences from Network Rail were needed for all the contractors due to the proximity of large cranes to the railway. This has now been resolved. We are now awaiting the 'Green Light' and have started emptying the 'Buckies' ready for the workmen to start the demolition.

There will be a lot of disruption but the garden will do what it does every year and spring back into action.

From the Gardener

The mild January has allowed the team and me to achieve all our programme of jobs. Back in the Autumn, we continued to plant hundreds of spring flowering bulbs to increase colour throughout. We assessed all the trees and shrubs and then carried out our annual pruning to ensure access for the public and plant maintenance. Again we continued our mulching schedule in Sections 2 and 3 to add nutrients to the soil.



The Geddes Glasshouse was once again serviced and cleaned, along with all signs, noticeboards tree trail signs ready for our visitors. We are about to start refreshing all paths with new bark chippings. We have also been working on this year's chosen border for revamp. This included ripping out old plants, uncovering lost rock and removing huge tree roots. The Friends have installed new metal edging and will help with the replanting when

all the plants arrive. I have really enjoyed designing and getting stuck into border 4. Great fun!

There are still many jobs to be done but I can assure you that the Garden will be ready for all its visitors. As always a very big thank you for your continued support! **Michael Laird**

From the Gardening Team

I am delighted to report that the Monday gardening team, usually 8 or 9 hardy souls, continue to turn up at 10 a.m. come rain or shine. They have been kept busy carrying out garden improvements, which included the purchase and installing of new metal edging for an existing 'island bed'. This bed needs a total of 185 new plants, which will be paid for by the Friends. We have also been renewing the timber edging around the planting areas at the Geddes Glasshouse. It's a relief when the 11 o'clock train to London signals a coffee break!



In the nursery area, we are growing on plants for the garden and the plant table. This involves sowing seed, making cuttings of various types, and inserting them in pots and cold frames. When seeds have germinated and cuttings rooted, seedlings need to be pricked off and cuttings potted on into individual pots.

Spring must be round the corner as our Himalayan Lily seed, collected in the garden in Autumn 2018, has germinated and, hopefully, we will have flowering plants in 4 or 5 years' time. The Committee has decided to plant a Purple Leaved Acer in memory of Mary Saunders. Michael has prepared just the spot for the shrub in a reasonably sheltered position. This should develop into a shapely and long lived specimen shrub. I look forward to seeing members on Saturday 25th April at the Spring Clean Up.

Michael's gardening tips Protect fruit blossoms from late frosts by using fleece. Now is the time to tie in climbing and rambling roses on to frames etc. Start to gradually increase water given to houseplants at the start of the growing season.

Tuesday 23rd June 2020 Saughton Park, Edinburgh

Our first visit this year is to the newly redesigned and refurbished Saughton Park in Edinburgh – another hidden jewel according to Edinburgh Outdoors! We shall leave opposite Broughty Ferry Library at 10.00 am and hope to arrive by 11.30 am. After a coffee/tea break at the café, we will get a short talk from one of the Friends of Saughton Park, before wandering at will until 4.00 pm. when we shall depart for Dundee. Snacks and meals will be available at the new Bistro Café, which opens in time for Easter.



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Wednesday 22nd July 2020 Braco Castle Gardens, Perthshire

Leaving opposite Broughty Ferry library at 12.00 noon, we will first visit Crieff Garden Centre where there will be time for a snack, or a short browse. From there we travel to the garden at Braco Castle. It is described as a19th Century landscaped garden with a plethora of wonderful and interesting shrubs, bulbs and plants; an old garden for all seasons which has been tastefully expanded over the last 27 years, by Mr and Mrs M van Ballegooijen. The partly walled garden is approached on a rhododendron and tree-lined path featuring an ornamental pond. Spectacular spring bulbs and ornamental trees are all enhanced by the fantastic views of the Ochils. From the snowdrops through to the vibrant colours of autumn, this garden is a gem. The garden also contains a very interesting collection of azaleas. We anticipate leaving Braco for home around 4.00 pm.





Thursday 20th August, 2020 Crathes Castle

We leave Broughty Ferry en route for Crathes at 10.00 am. It is one of the National Trust of Scotland's most attractive properties. Situated in Royal Deeside, the journey should only take a little over an hour and, hopefully, we will arrive in time to purchase coffee (and maybe a cake). The group can then split up to visit the delightful gardens or beautifully preserved castle or, if exercise is needed, the adventure play area!

It is worth noting that the garden is a 'R.H.S. Partner Garden' and has many interesting plants and good practice on show. There should be plenty of time to see the castle and gardens and enjoy some refreshment before we board the coach at 4.00 pm for the return home.
