Work Party Report

Scree Bed: Part 3 - This winter project included removing unwanted plants and shrubs, digging out great mats of vinca and ivy, cutting down a tree, and arranging with Parks staff to remove the lower limbs from a large conifer. Soil contaminated with weeds and weed seed was removed. Fresh growing medium will now be mixed and placed in the area of the Scree Bed. Plants are being ordered for the scree and the areas round about and it is hoped that these will all be planted up to and including the Spring tidy up on 23 April. Seasonal maintenance has been done to the raised bed, the Himalayan Border and other areas around the Geddes glasshouse.



The Nursery Area: Following the completion of re-skinning the polytunnel, the Friends have provided materials and hard paving, made new doors and benches, and laid gravel. The unit will be revamped and we hope that Friends, with Parks co-operation, can build additional cold frames to improve the plant propagation.

We would like to start a regular Thursday afternoon practical work sessions - with coffee break - from approximately 1.30 to 3.30 pm. All members are invited to come along and do as much or as little as they wish - there are all sorts of jobs to do.

In Autumn, hundreds of bulbs were planted to increase the Spring colour - see if you can spot them! Winter maintenance continued on every border. The Geddes glasshouse and interpretation boards were cleaned and serviced. Both ponds were completely drained and cleaned out and will be filled shortly; also new and existing rocks were uncovered.



The Nursery has seen plenty of activity, with the polytunnel being totally refitted. It is now ready for hundreds of seeds to be sown and cuttings to be taken, ensuring our borders remain well stocked.

I look forward to 2011 and thank you for your continued support. Many events for all ages are to be held in the Rock Garden this year - please come along and support them.

Thursday 12 May: Rossie House, Forgandenny, Perthshire. Departing at 1 pm to the home of Judy and David Nichol situated just outside Forgandenny. The garden is wonderful at all times of year but we can expect to see bluebells, trilliums, meconopsis, rhododendrons and much more. Paths take you down by the stream, over bridges and eventually into the walled garden. Castlemilk and Herdwick sheep graze the paddocks. Tea and biscuits will round off our visit and we expect to be back by 5.30 pm.



Wednesday 8 June: Cortachy Castle Gardens, by Kirriemuir. Departing at 1 pm to Cortachy Castle, acquired by the Ogilvy family in 1625 and now owned by Lord and Lady Airlie who will welcome us on arrival. Unfortunately the Castle will not be open but the garden has much to offer, including Walled and Ladies Borders, a Jardinière and Pond. After our visit we will travel to the Strathmore Arms in Glamis for high tea. We expect to return by about 6.30 pm.

Wednesday 20 July: Castle Fraser, Aberdeenshire. Departing at 9 am to Castle Fraser, which boasts a colourful history and is well worth a tour. The gardens are laid out in a Capability Brown style and also have a lovely walled garden. We stop at the Clatterin' Brig for coffee and from there travel direct to the Castle. If you wish to make use of the 30-seater tearoom at Castle Fraser at lunchtime (at your own expense) we will be arranging two 'sittings'. On the way home, we will stop off at the Bervie Chipper and should be back in Broughty Ferry around 7 pm.

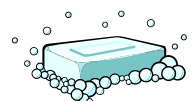
