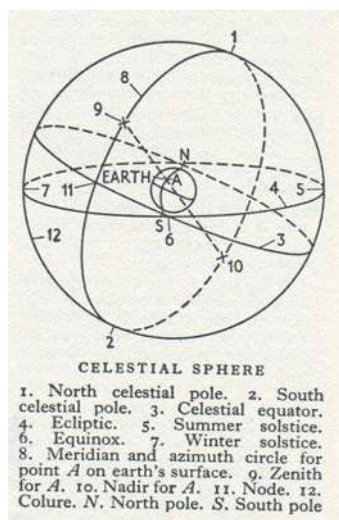




Newsletter - Spring 2012

History of links area - now Barnhill Rock Garden

Pre 1800s	Owned by Marquis of Montrose - archery on links.
Up to 1838	Wildlife area 'within the Dunelands of the Barony of Barnhill' (Dalhousie Estate).
1838	Dundee-Arbroath Railway constructed.
1895	Esplanade constructed.
1896/7	Golf course and ladies' golf club proposed - adviser Tom Morris. Earl of Dalhousie leased the ground for 14 years @£5 per annum. Clubhouse built, and opened on Sat 8 May 1897 (Provost Henry M Grady)
1902	That ground purchased from Earl of Dalhousie (for £500) by the Town Council of Broughty Ferry.
1913	Broughty Ferry amalgamated with Dundee.



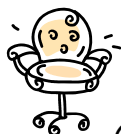

This mild weather has allowed us to get on with all our winter jobs and we mulched two thirds of the garden using our own compost to add fresh nutrients to the soil. The entire garden has been pruned to ensure everything is neat and tidy - this included removing large shrubs to create a vista of the River Tay and to Fife beyond when standing on the new bridge. Two borders have been ripped out and are now ready to be replanted - the compost area has also been made ready for the year ahead. The Geddes Glasshouse and the surrounding area has been spring cleaned for the coming visitor season and we are currently getting on with sowing seeds!. I can report that **your** garden is ready for 2012 and I thank you for your continued support.

Helpful Hint: Some things you ought to know about tea.



- 1 Tea leaves make a perfect mulch for camellias.
- 2 A used, squeezed out teabag makes an ideal nursery for a single seed; put 1 seed in the teabag and put several bags into a small pot of compost - perfect drainage, easy to plant out and no root damage.
- 3 Dry used tea and coffee bags. Open them up and sprinkle the contents on the lawn or garden for an instant fertiliser.

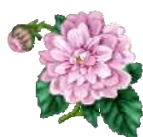
