

From the Gardener

Winter has flown in late this year! Due to the mild weather this has allowed us to get on with all the winter maintenance jobs and projects. We were weeding right up to December as the weeds would not stop growing.

In autumn we planted hundreds of narcissus bulbs, continuing to increase our spring display throughout. Other tasks included pruning or removing old shrubs/overgrown roses and mulching with our own compost, manure and leaf mould to improve soil nutrients. All paths were refreshed with new bark chipping to improve their appearance. I also really enjoyed getting involved with the Friends in designing, revamping and planting for our 'old bed rejuvenating programme'.

In early January, snowdrop wood was made ready for its debut on the snowdrop festival to ensure it looked its best. Unfortunately we lost a large Eucalyptus tree just before Christmas; however this has opened the area up allowing more light and moisture into the woodland.

The Friends and I were delighted that Ian Hunter and Ian Baxby both received a Community Champion award from Dundee City Council for their long service as volunteers at BRG. Well done!

We are trying our hardest to ensure the garden is ready for the 2019 season. And once again THANK YOU! for your continued support.

Thursday 16th May 2019 Cowden Castle, Dollar

Leaving opposite Broughty Ferry Library at 1.00 pm, we travel to the Japanese garden at Cowden Castle, near Dollar. This garden was originally created

in 1908 by a Japanese woman, Taki Handa. Despite being described as the most important Japanese garden in the western world, it fell into neglect. The garden has now undergone three years of intensive restoration and is a tranquil and beautiful place to visit. After a short introduction, we shall be free to wander at will. Tea/coffee will be served at the café before leaving Cowden at approximately 4.30 pm.



Tuesday 18th June 2019 Rodney Gardens, Perth

Last summer we visited 'Edinburgh's secret garden'. Perth also has a lovely garden that many people are unaware of – the Rodney Gardens,

which have been extensively renovated in recent years. So again, leaving opposite the library at 1.00 pm, we travel to Perth where either a member of the Friends of Rodney Gardens, or a representative of Perth Council, will introduce us to the Garden. We might even get a cup of tea but that has still to be confirmed! We will then be free to wander through this delightful site by the river. Leaving at 3.45 pm we are returning via Glendoick Garden Centre where we will stop for refreshments (buy own) and the chance to buy plants etc. We will leave Glendoick at 5 pm approximately.



Wednesday 17th July 2019 Glamis Castle Gardens

Our final trip of the summer is to Glamis Castle. We leave at 1.00 pm from opposite the library and we are booked for the gardens and the exhibition

at the Coach house (Women of Glamis) – not the castle tour. There is plenty to see with the Italian garden, the Walled garden as well as nature trails and the Macbeth trail. There is a café and restaurant where refreshments can be purchased. We will leave Glamis at approximately 4.30 pm.

Bumble food, no bumbles

Here we are on a lovely early February afternoon having completed first BeeWalk of the year! It's early in the year but we were tempted outside by snow (Lily) and spring longing (me)! So, armed with a stick (Lily) and flask (me), off we set. There were no bumbles in sight but plenty of 'bee food' for our bumble friends for when they appear later in the spring crocus erupting, bergenias, hellebores, bell heathers and gorgeous viburnum blooms....all a wonderful smorgasbord for hungry queen bumbles emerging from their winter sleep. As we walk we remember the joys of last season...10 tree bumbles on our June walk on the green alkanet by the railway; finding literally hundreds of white and buff







tails on the cotoneaster in July; seeing the most enormous queen we have ever seen; walking through hot sultry days but actually seeing hardly any and never really knowing why!

When we arrived home, I went straight into my own garden to remind myself of all the potential food sources there for bumbles and plan to add more. More Beewalkers are needed to record the abundance of the different species so that something can be done to help understand the decline. Lily and I would encourage you to join us on 15th June to tell you a little more about the bees and then walk you round our route (transect). See Events page for further details.
