From the Editor

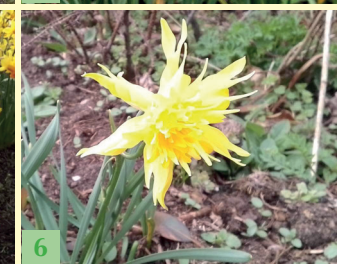
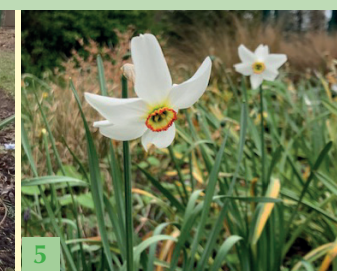
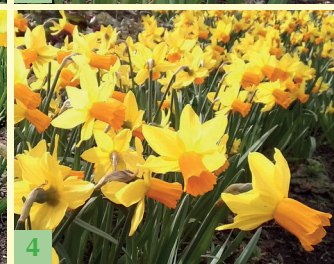

With our £13K from a combination of the Friends' not inconsiderable contribution and our successful grant applications, the amount required for the total overhaul of the system (the installation of new water pipes and electrics) has been reached. The work is finished, thanks to further monies granted to us from part of Dundee's allocation of Scotland's 'Nature Regeneration Fund'.

*“When all at once I saw a crowd,
a host, of golden daffodils...”*

Daffodils have been cheering the gloom of late Winter to Spring for millennia. England and Wales have their own native species, *Narcissus pseudonarcissus*, while Scotland's are regarded as introduced. During the 19th century plant collecting era, species daffodils were collected from the Mediterranean regions and North Africa and hybridised into the divisions and varieties of today. These range from Trumpet Daffodils (varied forms) to dwarf Cyclamineus (swept back petals), and *Bulbocodium* (1) (with a 'hooped petticoat' flower).

All the photos above and below show a selection of varieties found in the Garden including the Miniatures '**Tete a Tete**'(2), '**Jack Snipe**'(3), and '**Jetfire**'(4); the Poeticus '**Pheasant's Eye**'(5), and the Double '**Rip van Winkle**'(6). After more daffodil planting last autumn, Spring 2026 should have a good show. Come and see what you can spot and be uplifted. **Godfrey Nicholson**





From the Chair

This has been my first 6 months in post and it has not been without lots of challenges. The Garden has never known so many storms, one after another. After consultation with the Council and Network Rail, this has resulted in more conifers being felled for safety reasons.



I am pleased to say that our long standing project, 'The Water Feature', has been completed, with a little money left in the pot. We have decided,

under advice, to have all the channel edges re pointed to fully complete the project, hopefully for many years to come.

We have finished our winter projects and started one which had been deferred due to consultations with the Council. This is the re-design of the heather border and involves positioning sleepers to provide a more stable, secure growing area for the heathers, especially the East side where replaced heathers suffered in the long, dry summer.

The seemingly constant wet weather has not been helpful, but we have begun to see 'the wood from the trees'. A little bit of drizzle does not seem to deter us. We have again been lucky to have leaves donated from St. Margaret's Church. This allows us to produce our own leaf mould, an asset for our borders.

Today aconites and snowdrops are peeping through and once again we are on 'The Snowdrop Trail'. I look forward to the next 6 months when the Garden springs into flower. I hope it brings everyone, like myself, the delight of a year to come.

I write this article on the first day of sunshine. Thankfully the rain has now stopped at last. It's great to see the snowdrops, winter aconites and crocus starting to appear.

Once again, we carried out a programme of pruning to remove any dead or diseased branches and improve access where needed. Mulching jobs have been hindered by the rain, but it is hoped to complete this task very soon with a good mixture of leaf mould and our own compost. The continued rain has allowed us to do the usual cleaning activities to ensure everything is ready for the growing season.

I am delighted that the Garden is on the Scottish snowdrop festival which I hope will attract visitors in this less busy season. The Countryside Ranger has been along to do a bird box workshop using the kits that the Friends purchased. It was very well attended.

In April, we will ensure the water feature is cleared of any debris so it is ready to be switched on for everyone to enjoy again. It's fantastic to hear the water flowing once more. Thanks go to everyone who helped in this joint project between the Council and the Friends to restore it.

Seed sowing should start soon to help improve colour and interest in various areas. We have planted a selection of grasses (calamagrostis brachytricha) provided by the Council to brighten up a drab area near the back fence towards the water feature. Hopefully, this will make a difference. We also received new maps for each notice board to encourage visitors to navigate around less frequented parts of the Garden.

SUMMER OUTINGS 2026

Wednesday 24th June 2026 - Wormistoune Gardens

Leaving Broughty Ferry at 1pm, we will drive to Wormistoune gardens on the eastern tip of Fife. Here, there is a walled garden which contains clipped yew hedges, herbaceous borders and a potager garden. Other highlights include water features, an intricate box parterre, a wildflower meadow,

a large landscaped pond and an extensive woodland area. On our return journey, we will stop off at the nearby Crail Golf Hotel, from where we can either walk around Crail or partake of tea / coffee and a scone in the hotel. We anticipate being back in Broughty Ferry around 6pm.

Tuesday 21st July - Helensbank House

Our July outing also leaves at 1pm, and is to Helensbank House near Kincardine. It has an 18th Century walled garden divided into garden 'rooms' featuring a blue and white cottage garden, an Italianate double courtyard with citrus trees, an 'exotics' courtyard, a formal garden for the national collection

of Portland roses, and a shaded walk with Japanese elements. An impressive feature is the 'notable' Cedar of Lebanon believed to have been planted in 1750 by the sea captain who built the house. Following our tour, we will have coffee / tea and scones before returning home by 6pm.

Thursday 20th August - Kirklands Garden

At 1pm, we will leave Broughty Ferry and drive to Kirklands in Fife, a journey of approximately 1 hour 30 mins. The bus will stop in the square with a short walk to the gardens. The woodland garden comes to life in February and in Spring the rockery area has a wonderful display of flowering dwarf azaleas in various colours. The herbaceous borders peak in

late summer, with yellow rudbeckia, verbena and echinacea. There is also a walled garden with raised borders. The Saline Burn runs along the bottom of the garden with 20 acres of natural woodland. A pathway runs along the stream. Tea/coffee and scones will be provided. We expect to be back in Broughty Ferry at approximately 6pm.
